DOLLAR RATE KEPT UNDER SCRUTINY

The longest trading day for gains in the Canadian dollar on the open exchange market, and the very strong balance in the national trade and exchange notes, held out good prospect that the higher valuation rate maintained for some time on the open market.

At the same time, however, the Government evidently intends to keep close watch on the situation as it develops in the immediate future. An ample degree of control has been retained through which, by one means or another, stabilizing measures could be taken should the present hold and constructive venture accurately sharply adverse trends, as the result of abnormal or unforeseen factors. The Government also faces the problem of how such reserves are to be utilized to meet commitments to the International Monetary Fund for maintenance of a stable, convertible, and defensible exchange rate.

In its latest statement, removal of the official rate, Hon. D. C. Abbott, Finance Minister, made it plain that in general structure of exchange control was being retained, with present restriction over purchase of Canadian dollars for the purpose for which it is to be used. He also alluded to the Government's commitments, under the International Monetary Fund agreement, to maintain a stabilized rate of exchange for Canada.

The Fund agreement requires member countries to declare normal or established rates of exchange in the Fund organization, and to use in it the actual prevailing rate or rate fluctuating by more than 1 per cent either way from the declared rate. Government may from time to time vary the declared official rate by up to 10 per cent without violating the agreement's terms or giving notice of the Fund, though normally Fund officials would be advised and consulted about such changes.

The Fund was advised of Canada's decision to allow it was last week by R.A.F. McLeod, who is John Brien's chief economic adviser in Canada of an exchange from Britain, early in the New Year. They will receive basic training in Cranville, Ont., and then proceed to the United States.
